Chair Lutz called the meeting to order at 6:01 p.m.

Report Made and Held 6-0-0

Chair Lutz stated that many constituents have concerns about students having to walk in the street to school due to large piles of snow at crosswalks. The Committee discussed this item with Mr. Lee and Mr. Perrotta:

- Crews focus on clearing a single road path for emergency vehicles, then do a "comeback" to complete the roads, then priority crosswalks are cleared.
- Schools are opened once buses can get through, but often the walkers are still
  not able to walk to school safely.
- Parks Dept. has agreed to clear both sides of the openings at crosswalks by parks near schools.
- If we have an ordinance, we need the personnel for compliance.
- There could be an ordinance shifting responsibility of clearing openings at crosswalks to the property owners, but it would be unreasonable to expect a resident to clear large mounds of snow pushed from a snowplows.
- Residents will often clear sidewalks, then plows come and cover the sidewalk with heavy snow/ice.
- Mr. Lee will find out if school custodians can clear crosswalks near schools.
- The Committee needs a list of priority crosswalks and will wait for the crossing guard report that Asst. Chief Wuennemann is finishing up.
- The Committee will examine redefining the scope of the snow removal ordinance to possibly include outsourcing the clearing of targeted crosswalks when there is a minimum snowfall amount.

36. E30.024 REVIEW; Protocol for hiring daily substitute teachers, performing background checks and screenings. Procedures in place for reporting and informing schools district wide about substitute teacher misconduct or suspected misconduct.

Mr. Falcone explained the process of hiring substitutes and discussed with the Committee:

- There are approximately 300 substitutes employed by SPS.
- Approximately 200 substitutes are needed daily, and 85% of those can usually be filled.
- High turnover due to the nature of the position.
- The application process includes: application, screening, short interview.

- The hiring process includes: FBI criminal background check, DCF registry check, educational employer verification check, onboarding process, orientation.
- The educational employer verification check relies on the information given to the SPS by the applicant.
- The procedure has been codified so that when a substitute is excluded from a school due to a serious misconduct allegation, that employee is excluded from all schools until a full investigation is completed, and a determination is made about the employee's status.

The Committee paused the discussion at 7:02 p.m. to wait for Mr. Falcone and Mr. George to attend another meeting. At 7:30 p.m. Chair Lutz stated the Committee would invite Mr. Falcone back to the next Committee Meeting.
