Report Made

Chair Cottrell explained she put this item on the Agenda to have a discussion on the issues and the good work that is being done by AFBA.

Ms. Forman gave an overview of AFBA, reviewed the attached <u>presentation</u>, and there was discussion.

- AFBA is a grass roots organization looking to close the achievement gap. The focus is on Black students because the data shows that the gap is most pervasive between Black students and other students.
- Stamford is a great city for an organization such as this and to be a model for other cities.
- There four main objectives of AFBA:
 - o Elevate, embrace and sustain voice of Black parents/guardians and students.
 - Implement programs, policies and practices to promote Black student achievement and social-emotional well-being.
 - Increase the representation of Black educators at each level of the Stamford Public Schools.
 - Establish the Stamford BOE as an AFBA partner in leading the work of equity, anti-racism and educational justice for Black students in Stamford.

- It is important for students to meet grade level goals in elementary school, as it gets harder to engage struggling students in grades 6-12.
- More funding is needed for the higher level grades because much of school funding is for programs in grades K-5.
- There are social workers on staff who can make home visits to chronically absent students and their families if the need arises.
- Stamford has received funding from the Learning Engagement and Attendance Program (LEAP) to address chronic absenteeism.
- The pandemic further affected students who were already chronically absent.
- The Domus Family Advocacy Program is involved in the 6-12 grade levels.
- Different communities need assistance at different times. Parent Facilitators
 positions were created to reach out to the Hispanic and Latin American parent
 groups to engage them and the process has been successful.
- Programming and supports are needed for the staff to help struggling students.
- Broadening outreach is very important.
