Chair Di Costanzo called the meeting to order at 6:33 p.m.

Mr. Jankowski explained that this grant is for a radio interoperative system which enables Fairfield County police departments to communicate with one another. The system has not been upgraded since 2010. Stamford acts as a fiduciary in connection with this grant.

Ms. Carpenter discussed Item No. 2 with the Committee. This is a resolution to hire a consultant for the repurposing of the Lathon Wider Center. There is no City funding involved. The consultant will be required to get input from current users and community members. Mr. Blessing explained that this came out of the South End Neighborhood Study, which recommended turning Lathon Wider into a community campus, to improve on what is there now and serve the needs of the community. There is no consultant at this point. The consultant would be tasked with coming up with any capital funds.

Mr. Blessing explained that this is the Declaration of Trust as required under the ordinance creating the Stamford Historic Preservation Trust Fund. The Trustees are 5 ex officio members and 2 members of the community with either historic preservation credentials or who reside in or own an historic property. Any expenditure over \$10,000 requires Board of Representatives approval. Currently there is no solid funding source for the trust fund. The fund can apply for grants and will get funds from fees. Currently the fund has \$1000. A trustee who is an owner of an historic property would not be able to ask for funds or would have to recuse themselves. It was felt it was important to have someone on the Board who understood the problems of owning an historic property. It is unlikely that the trust would give money to individual properties. An historic property would be on the national or state register or on the City's list of cultural resources. The wording in Section IV (c) regarding ceasing to have historic preservation experience is unclear. There was no one from the law department present to address whether the Board could amend this declaration of trust to delete this language. The wording in Section IV (d) only applies to someone who is brought on because they own historic property and should be clarified. Does Section V, subsection (h) apply per property or in aggregate. This will apply in the aggregate.

Dr. Calder stated that the State has recognized that there are areas where they are not seeing the level of vaccine coverage they would like; this is in neighborhoods which have high social vulnerability indexes. The grant period is May 1st to August 31st. This is a very intensive initiative. The City is required to partner with a healthcare provider which is not the local health department and a community-based organization and has partnered with CHC and Family Centers. The state will provide vans. The funds will be used for 4 nurses, 25 community health workers, onsite interpreters, a centralized call center for people without internet, and an aggressive education program.

Ms. Carpenter explained that the City submitted the March to June expenses in October 2020. The State grant manager required them to rework the submission to \$654,500. This amount was then reduced to \$460,580, but the City is appealing this reduction and expects to true up this amount. The funds were used for police, firefighters, equipment, and supply rental. The supplies are mostly PPE. If the City does not get the full amount, there will be reconciliation with the next appropriation.

Mr. Buttenwieser stated that this appropriation is a grant through WestCOG to replace the old induction loop technology with 360 degree GRIDSMART cameras. The cameras do not require cutting into the street to be repaired and are more reliable and easier to control. There is no ability to record data with these cameras. The Traffic Bureau has been advocating with the state and developers to have them install these cameras. These cameras change light phases and collect traffic data. Replacement of the induction loops requires crews in the road, cutting into the road. This improves maintenance costs and is safer for crews.

Mr. Buttenwieser stated that this appropriation is a grant from CT DOT for lower Summer Street between Broad and Main Streets. This is the same grant used for Boxer Square. The City and community have input on this design, which will widen the sidewalks, improve lighting, increase activity, safety, and ADA accessibility. There will still be a lane of traffic. There may be parking taken away on the west side of the street. There is very little parking there now since there is outside dining. There is always capacity in the garages.

30th in order for the City to apply for these grants. They have had to attend pre-application meetings with the State, which requires both renovate as new and new design concepts.

¹⁴Mr. Casolo and Mr. Gollenberg presented the <u>attached PowerPoint presentation</u> regarding the Stamford Early Childhood Education Center Replacement Project. Committee members discussed the proposals and the importance of pre-K with the invited guests.

- There are approximately 400 students in portables that are 25 years old at the site
- It is a good site for a preschool
- Combining it with the Apples program will reduce bussing inconvenience
- This could be a model program for other parts of the state
- Due to Covid, 13 out of 39 pre-K programs have closed and won't reopen
- The city needs to help families struggling to provide day care or pre-K
- This is an example of collaboration between SPS and pre-K programs
- Each option would have a capacity of 676 students; the current total capacity of Apples (215 students; 190 with IEPs; 16 students in school readiness), CLC at Lockwood has about 200-250 students; the Apples program increases about 8% per year
- The finger option is the preferred option because of the small clusters of students within the larger area
- The current Apples space would be used for something else, possibly a middle school special ed program or an AITE extension
- The incoming kindergarten class is projected at slightly at 1426 students, but since 200 students were kept out of school due to Covid, it is not clear if these students will go into kindergarten or first grade.

- The projected number of students 8 years out is 2458
- The current enrollment is 2183

Mr. Stackpole explained that the City will be doing a full revaluation of all 38,000 parcels in the City. This requires reinspection. MVS did the revaluation in 2017 and 2007 and is familiar with Stamford. The cost of this contract is \$910,000, with a few other additional services. The City would like to get a notice out to residents in the tax bill being sent in June of the door-to-door inspection. Committee members requested more time to review backup material before voting.
