Report Made

Mr. Casolo discussed this item. He explained the bridge is almost 76 years old, has been closed since April, and there are long detour routes. The project has been fast tracked due to restrictions by DEEP to be out of the instream area by Sept. 30th, and in order to be finished before the winter shutdown period. There were four bids and A. Vitti Excavators came in under budget. The technical aspects of the project was explained. A motion was made and seconded to hold this item for one month to look into the issue of the contractor's current City violations. It was agreed upon that regardless of that issue, the bridge project needs to move forward so it can be completed before winter. The motion was withdrawn. Mr. Casolo stated that this contractor has done a lot of work for the City and is very reliable. He anticipates the new bridge will be opened by December, weather permitting. Mr. Pollard said that while the City has the authority to prohibit certain contractors from bidding on projects, this is restricted to the inability to perform on previous City projects. Mr. Casolo said the utility relocation phase is on schedule, so there should be no delays.

Mr. Zeiss gave an overview of the Anti-Blight complaints are processed. There are currently 80 open complaints. He spends 10-20 hours per week investigating, and has one assistant to help with paperwork. He reviewed the Anti-Blight Update presentation (attached). Some complaints can take a long time to resolve, and others only a few hours. Sometimes there are extenuating circumstances wherein the homeowner is not capable of cleaning up the blight, and Mr. Zeiss tries to figure out a way to resolve it with the homeowner. The homeowner, not the City, is responsible for removing blight on their property. Mr. Zeiss will get back to the committee with an analysis of the blight budget over the past five years.

Water Act - NDPES Permit #CT0030279 Authorizing

Storm Water Discharge via MS4. 06/05/17 – Submitted by Rep. Ryan

Rep. Ryan explained that he brought this issue to the committee because the City drains storm water directly from the street into Long Island Sound, and this includes sewage. Mr. Pollard said that in 2013 the City was notified it was in violation of MS4, and as a result, assets were invested in to comply with the MS4 program. Mr. Theder and Mr. Brink explained managing storm water discharge. Stamford is the only municipality in Connecticut that has a Phase #1 NDPES. In the last reporting year, 1,767 catch basins were cleaned, and 3,000 tons of liquid and solid materials were removed which would have been washed out into Long Island Sound. There are approximately 11,000 basins on City property, and 5,000 on private property. Private property owners are responsible for cleaning basins on their property. There are new medallions in English and Spanish on the basins telling citizens not to dump, which helps with enforcement. There is educational outreach in middle schools. The best way to make a complaint is either through Citizens Services or online with the Storm Water Management Department.
