## **Committee Report**

The Parks & Recreation Committee met as indicated above. In attendance were Co-Chair Mahoney and Committee Member Reps. de la Cruz, Giordano, Matherne, Saftic, Stella and Watkins. Absent or excused were Co-Chair McGarry and Committee Member Reps. Aquila, Pratt, and Wallace. Also present were Reps. Jacobson, Lee, McMullen, Sherwood and Zelinsky; Chris Dellaselva, Law Dept.; Mark McGrath, Director of Operations; Doug Bora, Leigh Shemitz, and Bud Grebey, Soundwaters, Inc.; Meghan Miles, Carmody law firm; and seven members of the public.

Co-Chair Mahoney called the meeting to order at 7:03 p.m.

Co-Chair Mahoney opened the public hearing at 7:04 p.m. Two members of the public spoke. There being no one else wishing to speak, Co-Chair Mahoney closed the public hearing at 7:08 p.m.

There was extensive discussion on this item. Some key points brought up:

- This is a 50 year lease with a total of 25 years of renewal options.
- SoundWaters currently has a 50 year lease, expiring in 2055, and the reason for the amendment is to build the new educational center.
- Soundwaters is responsible for all capital improvements, and does not get City funding.
- SoundWaters operates 12 months per year, with a full time staff. The programs
  offer an opportunity for many students who would not otherwise have access to
  these types of activities. Most of the students in the full time summer camp are
  on scholarship.
- The <u>attached memo</u> from Superintendent Lucero was read into the record.
- Donors will be donating approximately \$8 million to the new educational center.
- The park is currently not in the best of shape, and the master plan will improve it.
- There are provisions in the lease that if the building is not maintained properly, it becomes the property of the City.
- Public/private partnerships can be complicated.
- Although SoundWaters does not receive subsidy from the City, some feel that a \$1.00 per year lease can be considered a subsidy.
- Park land is a limited commodity in Stamford, and residents have the right to enjoy all of it.
- Residents should get something in return for giving up part of their parks.
- The SoundWaters programs and activities should be accessible for the average family who does not fall into either the scholarship category or higher income category.
- The City is leasing the land, and assigning rights to the water.
- The land portion is for approximately 16,000 square feet. A public referendum is not required for less than 20,000 square feet of land.
- The lease concerns 3% of Boccuzzi Park.
- There can be complications with riparian (water) rights, such as environmental issues occurring and the City needing to access the assigned water area.
- Clarification is needed on the terms "leasing", "assigning rights" and "transfer".

A motion was made and seconded to hold the item.

A motion to table the previous motion to hold was made, seconded and approved by a vote of 5-1-0 (Reps. Mahoney, de la Cruz, Giordano, Matherne and Watkins in favor; Rep. Stella opposed).

A motion to hold this item was made, seconded and approved by a vote of 4-3-0. (Reps. Giordano, Matherne, Saftic and Stella in favor; Reps. Mahoney, de la Cruz and Watkins opposed).
