¹1. SC30.030 REVIEW; Discuss the Effects of Unfunded State Mandates on Property Taxes and Municipal Budgets. Ms. Dennies reviewed the item and there was discussion:

- The MS-4 Stormwater management mandate is the most costly unfunded mandate on the City side and it has federal roots.
- The next most costly mandates on the City side are within the building department which include, but are not limited to, residential solar permits, licensure of building officials, permits to construct or alter, and physical disability structures.
- Building code changes and requirements are exceptionally impacted by state mandates.
- State mandates exist for a purpose: most of them are for public safety and to improve the quality of life for residents.

- There are no state mandates which the building department feels are unnecessary.
- The intent of this agenda item was to gain information to assist in the next budget season as a way of seeking possible easement or different ways of managing the mandates to make budget savings. The information gained will be helpful toward this.

²2. <u>SC30.032</u> REVIEW; Legislation and Regulatory Structure Concerning the Operations and Rate Setting of Eversource. 09/09/20 – Submitted by Rep. de la Cruz, Cottrell, Lee, Giordano, Zelinsky, Figueroa and Adams

Rep. de la Cruz explained his reason for putting this item on the agenda, and there was discussion:

- Mr. Jankowski explained that the Eversource response to the August 4, 2020 storm was not acceptable. There was poor preparation, response, communications, and collaboration.
- He reviewed the <u>attached</u> formal complaint to PURA (Public Utilities Regulatory Authority). The goal of the complaint is to improve response, communications, and collaboration on future events.
- He has requested that PURA hold Eversource responsible for the response of the storm, and to ensure this situation does not happen again.
- There is a bill being brought up in a special session in the State Legislature on September 30, 2020 to address some issues with Eversource. Some of the goals are to get interim rate decreases and credits for loss of food and electricity.
- Not all issues with Eversource are being addressed in this special session. This
 is best done in a series of measures during regular sessions.
- The State level energy chairs are in ongoing discussions and negotiations with Eversource.

The State & Commerce Committee will put a resolution on next month's agenda. The Committee will work towards putting together a strong resolution to Eversource, combined with supporting ratepayer testimony, to be ready for the legislative session in January, 2021.

Chair Miller adjourned the meeting at 8:00pm.
