<u>COMMITTEE/BUDGET PRESENTATION</u>: Sean Boeger and Lindsey Miller, Co-Chairs, Fiscal Committee; Richard Freedman, Chair, Board of Finance.

Richard Freedman stated that this is the 3<sup>rd</sup> year of a contribution to a special funds for school construction (Fund 57). Under State law to create a special reserve to fund capital projects, it must be approved by both the fiscal board and the legislative body. The Board of Finance set the mill rate in two parts – a base mill rate and a portion allocated to the capital reserve. Mr. Freedman shared the attached PowerPoint presentation.

Committee members discussed this item with Mr. Freedman. Items discussed included the following:

- Fund 57 has earned about \$2 to \$2.5 million of interest
- This will save the city about \$600,000 in interest per year for every \$10,000,000. It will save the City about \$6 million over the life of a 20 year bond. Fund 57 is not supposed to be an endowment; it will be spent, but is earning interest in the interim. The money won't be spent until the construction starts and the fund will expended in about 7-8 years
- This helps the City's bond rating
- The surplus allocation for FY 22-23 will be coming to the Board of Finance in June. The Mayor will recommend an allocation to Fund 57. The best approach for the City is to put as much as possible into Fund 57 through the mill rate, rather than the surplus, because future surpluses are unknown. Mr. Freedman believes that the City should be putting in \$15-20 million per year. It is \$10 million this year based on an agreement of the BOF and the BOR to keep the mill rate down. There is no commitment to fund this every year. The City has large capital obligations that need to be funded.

• The surplus allocation for FY 22-23 may be about \$20-25; most of this will not be operating surplus; about \$5 million may be allocated to Fund 57

A motion to approve Item No. 1 was made, seconded, and approved by unanimous voice vote.

ADJOURNMENT: Majority Leader Sherwood adjourned the meeting at 8:44 p.m.
