Advancing Economic Prosperity

Economic Snapshot

- Total Population: 135,470
- AAA Bond Rating Reaffirmed by Fitch
- FY22: \$14M surplus, FY23: \$29M surplus
- Grand list growth to \$27 billion
- Mill rate decreased from 25 to 23.6
- Commercial Vacancy Rate down from 33% to 28% in 2023
- Apartment Occupancy Rate of 94%
- 15th Most Diverse City for our size in the country
- Top 10% nationally for the number of corporate headquarters, and 2,000 new small businesses started in 2023
- Robust businesses, nonprofits, arts and cultural institutions, a nationally ranked hospital, a growing UConn Stamford campus, and excellent K-12 schools
- Ranked one of the safest cities in New England
- Ranked by Niche one of the best cities in CT to live in; 108th best city in the nation; 47th best city for young professionals

FY2024-2025 Budget Priorities

Investing in high-quality services for Stamford residents:

- **Schools:** Authorized 14 school projects and continued investments in school reserve (Fund 57)
- **Public Safety:** Investments in Police, Fire, EMS and 911 Call Center to meet City's growing needs
- **Parks and Sustainability:** Doubled investment for parks, added new funding for parks enforcement and sustainability initiatives
- Roads, Sidewalks, and Pedestrian Safety: Investments in road paving, new sidewalks, and pedestrian safety initiatives
- Seniors and Veterans: Continued expansion of senior citizen and veterans' property tax credit levels
- Financial Reporting: Investments in new systems to address financial reporting
- **Fiscal Responsibility:** Lower mill rate, worked to minimize impact of property revaluation on residents in 2nd year of phase in, responsibly funded long term pension obligations; safe debt limit












Affordable Housing Executive Order Updates

In 2023, I signed the City's first Affordable Housing Executive Order, with the goal of **creating or renovating 1,000 affordable housing units by 2025**. Over **637 units** have been completed or are in the pipeline for completion for newly built or renovated units. Below is a snapshot of affordable housing projects that are expected to be completed or under construction over the next year:

- 36 Ann Street (Pacific House) new construction of 11 rooms for supportive housing; \$375,000 allocated from the Affordable Housing Trust Fund.
- Oak Park Phase 1 (Charter Oak Communities) redevelopment of 61 affordable rental units (25% 60% AMI); \$3,452,012 awarded in fee-in-lieu through the Below Market Rate (BMR) Program, \$1,250,000 allocated from the FY2024-2025 Capital Budget and \$750,000 from the Affordable Housing Trust Fund.
- 41-45 Stillwater Avenue (Pacific House) new construction of 43 supportive housing units; \$750,000 allocated from the Affordable Housing Trust Fund.
- Stamford Manor Phase 1 (Charter Oak Communities) preservation of 215 deeply affordable senior housing units; allocated \$1,000,000 from the Capital Budget.
- There are 105 on-site BMR units under construction right now, contributing to the more than 1,200 affordable units in the program.
- Proposed dedicating \$2M from FY23 surplus to transfer into the Affordable Housing Trust Fund.





Stamford Parks Community Partnership



- The Stamford Parks Community Partnership, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, was created to foster strong collaboration between the city, local businesses, and residents in developing and maintaining Stamford's parks system and recreational areas.
- The Partnership will leverage private funding to ensure Stamford's parks remain accessible and sustainable for future generations. It already has several corporate commitments, including from Wellbuilt Co., Henkel, Philip Morris International, and the Ashforth Company, as well as a dollar for dollar match up to \$100,000 commitment from Dalio Education.

Climate Change Executive Order Updates

In April 2023, I signed the City of Stamford's first Executive Order Addressing Climate Change and Sustainability, with the goal of promoting energy efficiency measures at municipal buildings, prioritizing green infrastructure projects, and creating a city Climate Action Plan. Below is a snapshot of the progress we have made toward these goals:

- Solar panel installation has been approved for four schools Westover, Stamford High, Strawberry Hill, and Rogers.
- Approximately 3,000 of our 10,000 streetlights have been converted to longer life, high-efficiency, LED fixtures.
- Expansion of the Food Scrap Recycling and Composting Program, including the purchase and installation of four new dehydrators and drop-off bins to be installed in locations throughout the city.
- Secured state funding to develop climate resiliency plans, including the COOLER Stamford Heat Resilience Action Plan
 focusing on the West Side, Waterside, and Downtown neighborhoods; the Toilsome Brook Flood Resiliency Plan to
 evaluate flooding and draining issues near the Ridgeway-Bullshead area; the Cummings Pond Area Flood and Ecological
 Resiliency Plan, which will conduct a hydrologic and hydraulic analysis to determine ways to mitigate flooding at
 Cummings Pond.
- Conducting a GIS tree inventory to help identify street tree planting opportunities, with the goal of planting 400 additional trees focusing on the West Side, East Side, South End, Downtown, and Waterside neighborhoods.

Responsive Government

Walk-In Permitting Center



- Established a permanent walk-in permitting center on the 7th floor of the Government Center.
- Provides residents with an opportunity to get inperson assistance from city officials regarding the permitting process related to residential and minor commercial projects.
- Next walk-in hours: Wednesday, July 10th from 9:30 am - 12:00 pm. Hours occur every other Wednesday.
- Average permitting wait time has been reduced from two years to 90 days.

Responsive Government Initiatives

My administration is committed to making government work better and be more responsive to residents' needs. Below is a snapshot of the progress we have made toward these goals:

- Held dozens of Citizen Service Hubs, Coffee Hours, and Town Hall forums in locations across our city to meet directly with residents and hear more about the issues that matter most to them.
- Distributed \$75,000 as part of the Community Microgrant Program toward specific projects aimed at improving the quality of life across Stamford's neighborhoods; in 2024, there were 38 recipients who received grant awards ranging between \$400 and \$3,500.
- Enhanced the Fix It Stamford dashboard.
- Made the Stamfordct.gov website accessible in over 100 languages.



Mayor's Literacy Initiative



- Launched in 2023, the Mayor's Literacy Initiative aims to boost awareness about the importance of literacy. In collaboration with Stamford Public Schools' Birth to Five committee, the Ferguson Library, and Stamford Cradle to Career's Early Grade Reading Community Action Network, the initiative's goal is to assist children to read at grade-level by third grade.
- The initiative has hosted two successful community events including bilingual read-a-louds, free book giveaways, literacy-focused arts & crafts activities, and expanding access to local community resources.

Veterans Resource Center





- Established in February 2023, the Stamford Veterans Resource Center is a place for veterans and their families to be empowered, directed, and connected to available resources and services. It is open on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10:00 am - 1:00 pm.
- 200 veterans have been helped since the opening of the center.
- Peer Support and Family Support Groups occur every first and third Wednesday of the month at 11:00 am and 2:00 pm.
- Additional workshops include suicide awareness training, CPR/First aide training, vocational training, and legal service seminars.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Initiatives

The Office of Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, and Accessibility Strategies (IDEAS) for the City of Stamford has undertaken several initiatives to ensure we are being responsive to residents and our employees in equitable and accessible ways. Below is a snapshot of the progress we have made toward these goals:

- Nearly half of all city employees, Boards, and Commissions, and a dozen community organizations have gone through an I.D.E.A.S. training.
- Held the first Diversity Breakfast in partnership with the American Jewish Committee.
- Organize community and cultural celebrations and flag raisings.
- Established Juneteenth as a City Holiday and held two citywide Juneteenth celebrations
- Appointed 75 individuals to city boards and commissions.








Public Safety


Stamford Regional Police Academy





- In May, the Regional Police Academy opened at the Stamford Police Department headquarters. The academy offers Police Officer Standards and Training (POST) classes for groups of 30 recruit officers from across Region 1 of the Connecticut Division of Emergency Management and Homeland Security, which includes 14 municipalities in southwest Connecticut.
- Nine Stamford Police Department recruits were part of the first class to train at this academy.

Gun Safety Ordinance



In recognition of June as Gun Violence
 Awareness Month, I was joined by gun safety
 advocates and public safety officials to sign
 Stamford's first ordinance banning firearms
 and explosives from municipal buildings and
 polling locations.

Public Safety Investments

- 911 Call Center Enhancements and Second Fire Department Incident Commander –
 Civilianized the 911 call center and added a second career Incident Commander, known as Unit 5,
 to serve the newly designated "Northern District," and to expand city-wide fire department
 coverage. This area extends from Bulls Head and Glenbrook, northward to New Canaan and the
 New York State line.
- **Cybersecurity Enhancements** implemented comprehensive cybersecurity upgrades and launched a Secure Cyber City initiative in partnership with the Center for Internet Security
- **School Safety Communications** improved emergency communications for school safety, including a monthly emergency test text message; implemented one-way radios in the dispatch centers into all the school building administrative offices.
- Formalized Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) created a formalized board for the CERT team, including representation from the Police Department, Fire Department, and Health Department.
- **Stamford Youth Mental Health Alliance** launched the first marketing campaign, "Don't carry it alone. We've got you," aimed at spreading awareness to Stamford students of the mental health resources available in our community. Published a mental health resource guide in English, Spanish, Haitian Creole.





State & Federal Funding

State Bonding & Grants

In partnership with Governor Ned Lamont and Stamford's legislative delegation, the City secured state funding for the following projects aimed at improving quality of life. In total, over \$200 million in state reimbursement has been secured for school construction costs, and over \$13 million in grants for other infrastructure and resiliency projects.

> School Construction:

- Westhill High School original award in FY22 for \$257,938,824; increased in FY23 to \$301,313,888 due to cost escalation.
- Roxbury School \$51,600,000 approved in FY23.
- South School (Upper and Lower) \$158,335,408 approved in FY24

> HVAC Indoor Air Quality Improvements:

Stamford Public Schools was awarded \$2.7 million in state reimbursement for HVAC projects in seven schools including Julia Stark,
 Davenport, Cloonan Middle, Stamford High, Westover, Rippowam, and Northeast.

Resiliency Projects:

- \$598,125 to evaluate flooding issues in the Toilsome Brook watershed
- \$481,125 to address stormwater flooding in the Cummings Park watershed
- \$210,750 to develop neighborhood heat plan for Downtown, the West Side, and Waterside

> Infrastructure Projects:

- \$3M for Government Center improvements, ADA upgrades to sidewalks, green infrastructure, and food truck parking
- \$2.5M to develop a shared, micro-mobility pilot program to provide on-demand transit service to residents within a five-mile radius serving the West Side, East Side, South End, and Downtown
- \$2M for roadway safety improvements at the intersection of Washington Boulevard and Richmond Hill Avenue and \$2M for pedestrian safety improvements around the Springdale Train Station, and \$1M for sidewalks on Long Ridge Road
- \$223,608 for the planning and design of the Weed Avenue Multi-Use Trail

Federal Funding

Working in partnership with our federal delegation, the City of Stamford will benefit from over **\$54 million in federal funding investments** for the following projects:


- Federal Transit Administration: \$26M for 20 electric buses for the CT Transit Stamford division
- Department of Transportation:
 - \$17M for Reconnecting Communities and Neighborhoods Grant for West Side Neighborhood Connector Project
 - \$2.1M Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) grant to revitalize the West Main Street Corridor
 - \$2M Safe Streets and Roads for All grant for school sidewalk improvements
- > Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA): \$2.7M BRIC grant for pump station improvements
- National Park Service: \$1.81M Outdoor Recreation Legacy Partnership grant for improvements to Boccuzzi Park
- > **Department of Agriculture:** \$1M Urban and Community Forestry grant for street trees
- **Department of Labor:** \$513K workforce development grant for pre-apprenticeship programs and job training for students
- **Department of Justice:** \$133K body-worn camera policy and implementation program.
- > Environmental Protection Agency (EPA):
 - \$2.1M SWIFR grant to expand city's Food Scrap Recycling and Composting Program
 - \$68K enhanced air quality monitoring grant
- > National Endowment for the Arts: \$25K grant for mural at the Stamford Train Station garage

2024 Priorities

- Continue to make progress on infrastructure priorities, with a focus on the Stamford Train Station, schools, roads, sidewalks, pedestrian safety, parks, and sustainability projects.
- Advancing economic prosperity for residents, including attracting and retaining businesses and jobs, supporting small businesses and startups, expanding workforce development initiatives, and increasing new and renovated affordable housing units.
- Making government more responsive to residents to enhance quality of life by continuing to improve permitting process, Fix It Stamford, Veterans Resource Center programming, public safety enhancements, and hosting community forums for residents.
